SESSION 2

NO ONE IS TALKING:

How to get people engaged in your small group

The goal of every small group is engagement. And engagement looks different for everyone.

As the facilitator of your small group, don't be discouraged as you try to figure out how to get your group to speak. As you work toward conversation and engagement in your group, you will come to realize that what you are really doing is creating a culture. Be encouraged — the development of culture doesn't happen overnight! It requires time and patience.

In order to help facilitate conversation these three core principles will help you develop a culture of engagement that fosters conversation:

- 1. Ask open ended questions.
- 2. Engage in active listening.
- 3. Embrace the silence.

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PRO TIP:

Make notes in your mind or on a piece of paper what gets conversations rolling (whether it's a specific topic, phrase, certain people who encourage dialogue, etc.). It won't always be a specific formula, but it's good to know what has worked in the past as you build momentum with your group.

THINK ABOUT IT:

pescribe the type of culture you want to intentionally create in your current or future small group.	

PRACTICE IT:

Start "facilitating" conversation in your everyday life this week. Whether it's at the dinner table with your family, at a coffee shop with a group of friends, or in the breakroom at work. Practice asking open ended questions, using your active listening skills, and learning how to be comfortable in the silence (all three take practice!).
